Message from the President,

For cats and dogs at the Bella Vista Animal Shelter, life goes on as usual. Our dedicated and loving staff is there every day looking after them, just like always. With our cleaning protocol, it may be one of safest buildings to enter in today's environment. Still, we can't take a chance of COVID-19 community spread so only serious adopters are allowed at the shelter for now. My hope is that everyone is following CDC Guidelines so we can gain control of this virus and return to our "new" normal lives. I'm going to address two issues in my message for this newsletter: Microchips and Funding.

A microchip for cats and dogs is about the size of small grain of rice. It is inserted on the back of the neck between the shoulders so quickly, the dog or cat doesn't realize it happened. Once implanted, the animal is identifiable for life by anyone with a reading wand and access to a database. You can have your furry friends chipped by your veterinarian or bring them to the shelter where for \$20 they will be chipped and entered in a data base. Both the shelter and your Bella Vista Animal Control Officer have wands and access to the data base. Over half the dogs brought to the shelter are returned to their owners. If chipped, they could be returned home by animal control and avoid being taken to the shelter and confined until being reclaimed.

Surrounding major cities (Rogers, Springdale, Fayetteville) have replaced dog licensing and tags with microchipping. Bella Vista is on the cusp of doing the same but for some reason, our city council is reluctant to do away with licenses and tags entirely. We already know tags don't work. Animal Control has not picked up a dog with a city tag to date. Microchipping and registration would be a lifetime "license" for your dog.

The BVAS is facing the uncertainty of holding our major fund-raising events this year. They are the Garage Sale, Pars for Paws Golf Tournament and Wiener/Corgi Races. Area small businesses are the lifeblood for the golf tournament and races. During this pandemic, we understand when they are reluctant to make commitments even out as far as July and October. The city tells us they are unable to commit more funds to the shelter. That means the shelter will receive less than 25% of expenses from the City of Bella Vista this year. I would like to see a 50/50 partnership with our city

Social Distancing & Pets

It is healthy to spend time outdoors while physical distancing, as long as you are feeling well and can remain at least 6 feet away from other people. Avoid crowded areas like dog parks and busy trails, but quiet neighborhood streets and less popular trails can give you an excellent opportunity to get outside to a long walk with your dog. Fresh air and exercise will likely alleviate some of the stress and anxiety that you may be feeling, while giving your dog some fun and exercise.

If you have cats, find new ways to play with them indoors. There are many different types of cat toys available (many of which can be ordered online, allowing you to avoid a shopping trip), but cardboard boxes and balled-up paper that you likely already have at home can also provide a source of entertainment for both you and your cat.

In the animal care field we can see many bad things that people do to animals. We also are very fortunate to see the compassionate and generous side of people. Adopting a senior dog is a very hard thing to do for most people. They know that they are only going to have the animal for a short amount of time. On the other hand, no senior dog deserves to be discarded and allowed to die in a shelter after giving love to families for so many years.


